The Town recently invested significant funding to renovate the Maple Avenue streetscape with annuals, perennials, bushes and trees. The Town's Halloween Parade draws thousands of people that have routinely stood or sat in the streetscape beds to watch the parade. In an effort to protect the vegetation in the Maple Avenue streetscape planters, staff investigated three options to deter spectators from stepping into the planters. **Option 1 is the most effective method of creating a barrier** to keep people from stepping into the planters and least expensive.

- Option 1 Install 4 foot tall construction fencing around approximately 41 streetscape beds from Center Street to Branch Road –
 Total cost \$38,500 (\$32,500 one-time expense, \$6,000 recurring annual expense) Concerns: visibility issue for children shorter than 4 feet
 - Installation of PVC sleeves and caps in the street beds \$23,000 (one-time expense)
 - Material cost for wood stakes and construction fencing \$6,000 (one-time expense)
 - Labor to install and remove stakes and construction fencing (recurring annual expense) - \$6,000
 - Signage (250 24"x18" yard signs) \$3,500 (one-time expense)
- Option 2 Install temporary 18" tall PVC railing around approximately 41
 streetscape beds from Center Street to Branch Road Total \$53,500 (\$41,500
 one-time expense, \$12,000 recurring expense) Concerns: spectators will step over the rail and stand in bed, spectators will sit on the rail potentially damaging it and still put feet in the beds, no place to store the PVC railing in off season. (similar style of Option 3 but with one PVC rail)
 - Installation of PVC sleeves and caps in the street beds \$23,000 (one-time expense)
 - PVC material for rails \$15,000 (one-time expense)
 - Labor to install the PVC rails each year \$12,000 (recurring annual expense)
 - Signage (250 24"x18" yard signs) \$3,500 (one-time expense)
- Option 3 Fabricate and install 18" vertical steel one rail tree pit fence around approximately 41 streetscape beds from Center Street to Branch Road \$325,000 one-time fee. Typical/standard 18" H 2/3 line vertical steel tree pit fence. Concerns: spectators will sit on the rail potentially damaging it and still put feet in the beds, spectators will step over the rail and stand in bed.

Major New Initiatives:	Begin systematic brick repairs along Maple Ave and Church St				
Services Provided:	Within the Department of Public Works (DPW), the General Maintenance team is responsible for maintaining Town brick work including sidewalks, walls, aprons, and planter beds along Maple Ave and Church St. NOTE: In future years, will move this into Operating Budget. Currently will fund with ARPA.				
Cost:	\$100,000/ year ARPA 2025 & 2026; Operating thereafter.				
Key Opportunities:	DPW proposes additional funding to begin prioritizing larger sections of brick repair along Maple Ave and Church St using on-call contracted services. Brick repair will improve safety, accessibility, and aesthetic of the Town's aging infrastructure.				
Key Challenges:	Current staffing levels and resources are insufficient to cover larger sections of brick repair. Contract services allow a dedicated crew to focus on larger repairs. In-house staff will continue to address smaller brick maintenance concerns while balancing other General Maintenance responsibilities.
